

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INDUSTRY RECOVERS AFTER POST-BREXIT TURBULENCE

August saw the construction industry recover slightly from the falls seen in July, when figures from the Office for National Statistics (ONS) showed that construction had dipped into recession after two successive months of decline.

According to the ONS figures, the industry experienced a 0.7% decline during Q2 of 2016, following a decline of 0.3% in the first quarter.

Nevertheless, Market/CIPS figures released on 2 September showed the Construction Purchasing Managers Index (PMI) enjoyed an improvement in August, measuring 49.2 compared with July's figure of 45.9. While still below the no-change threshold of 50, August's figures do show that the pace of decline has slowed significantly, compared with the 85-month low recorded during the previous month.

UK manufacturing has weathered the uncertainty much better. After a brief downturn in July following the EU Referendum vote, the UK manufacturing PMI jumped to 53.3 in August – way above expectations and firmly signifying growth.

While initially post-Brexit there were reports of commercial clients and housebuilders postponing planned work, this seems to have eased

since, with sector data showing civil engineering activity recovering slightly in August. While housebuilding firms and commercial sectors are still showing a decline, some firms canvassed have noted that sales volumes have proved more resilient than expected.

Tim Moore, senior economist at Markit and author of the Markit/CIPS Construction PMI, said: "The downturn in UK construction activity has eased considerably since July, primarily helped by a much slower decline in commercial building. Construction firms cited a nascent recovery in client confidence since the EU referendum and a relatively steady flow of invitations to tender in August.

"However, the latest survey indicates only a partial move towards stabilisation, rather than a return to business as usual. There were still widespread reports that Brexit uncertainty had dampened demand and slowed progress on planned developments, especially in relation to large projects. As a result, total new order volumes continued to fall during August.

"Despite another month of reduced output, the latest figures can be viewed as welcome news after a challenging



summer for the construction sector. The move provides hope that the near-term fallout from Brexit uncertainty will prove less severe than feared."

David Noble, group chief executive officer of the Chartered Institute of Procurement & Supply, agreed that stabilisation was the order of the day following the short-term shock of the EU Referendum result.

"Business sentiment was moderately more positive than that seen in the immediate aftermath of the Brexit vote. After the shock of last month's seven-year low in the overall index, the picture now is more about stabilisation than searing growth, as the sector remained in contraction. The housing sector continued its downward slide, but the drop in activity was much softer in August," he said.

The weakened currency seen since the EU Referendum has increased costs for construction materials, leading the Federation of Master Builders (FMB) to warn over the impact this may have on small building firms in particular.

Chief executive Brian Berry said: "We've already heard accounts of timber and brick costs rising, and a number of sources have said that even steel prices have risen by 8% since the decision was made to leave the EU.

"Too many small firms are already operating on razor-thin margins and are forced to tender at prices which barely return a profit in order to remain competitive. This leaves little capacity to absorb dramatic price increases. The government must do everything in its power to reverse this situation and get Britain building again."



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
